




Discover Eastern Bhutan's Hidden Trail (Sheri Dzong-Ugyen Draplug- Aja Nye)

1) Discover the Sacred Sheri Dzong Nye

Sheri Dzong is one of the eight sacred dzongs blessed by Guru Rinpoche, located along the border of Trashi Yangtse and Mongar Dzongkhags. Revered for its deep spiritual significance, the site is a place of devotion, reflection, and purification for pilgrims from across the country. According to sacred belief, the cliff from which the holy water, known as Thrichhu, gushes forth resembles a sacred Vase (Bumpa), while the rock upon which the water falls is like a mirror. This natural formation is believed to symbolically perform Lhabsang Thrisel—a powerful ritual of purification that cleanses individuals and places of obstacles, negativities, and harmful forces.



Pilgrims visit Sheri Dzong to receive blessings and spiritual cleansing, seeking relief from physical, mental, and spiritual impediments. To support visitors, basic guest house facilities with toilets and a kitchen are available at the site, and being operated by the community. Reaching Sheri Dzong is itself a journey of faith. The pilgrimage involves approximately a six-hour trek from the nearest road point at Gangkhar village, offering visitors not only a spiritual experience but also an opportunity to connect with the pristine natural surroundings.



2) Discover the Sacred Ugyen Drapug Nye Pilgrimage



Nestled in the breathtaking landscapes of Mongar Dzongkhag, the Ugyen Drapug Nye (also known as Ugyen Drak) is a revered pilgrimage site closely linked to the famous Aja Nye (Aja Ney) complex. Both were blessed by the Guru Padmasambhava in the 8th century, making this area a spiritual retreat for many. Situated at an elevation 3,700 meters (about 11,800 feet) above sea level in Sherimuhung Gewog, Ugyen Drapug Nye is



one of several sacred cliffs and meditation spots believed to purify sins and guide pilgrims toward enlightenment. The journey to this sacred site is part of a multi-day pilgrimage, with a five-hour hike from Sheri dzong and a

seven-hour trek from Aja Nye, offering an immersive experience through Bhutan's pristine natural and spiritual landscape.

A two-unit shelter lodge was constructed with support from GEF funding to provide comfortable accommodation for pilgrims.

3) A Journey of Discovery: Ugyen Drapu–Aja Nye Hiking Expedition

A hike was undertaken along the trail stretching from Sheri dzong to Aja Nye via Ugyen Drapu, with the primary objective of studying its potential for structured tourism development (cultural tourism). The journey offered valuable insights into the trail's natural beauty, cultural significance, and readiness to be positioned as a sustainable hiking destination in eastern Bhutan.

The hike involved traversing the traditional route from Sheri dzong to Aja Nye, passing through Ugyen Drapu, allowing the team to closely observe trail conditions, accessibility, and visitor experience. This hands-on assessment was crucial in understanding how the trail can be developed while preserving its pristine environment and spiritual value.

As part of the visit, existing facilities along the route



were reviewed, including resting points, signage, and basic amenities. While the infrastructure established so far reflects commendable efforts, the assessment also highlighted areas requiring enhancement, such as development of hot-stone bath at Nimathang, improved wayfinding, rest shelters, sanitation facilities, and safety measures.

Scrub bull sterilization program in Mongar



A two-week-long Scrub Bull Sterilization Program was implemented across all Gewogs of Mongar Dzongkhag with financial support from CARLEP to reduce indiscriminate breeding by inferior sires and to encourage the uptake of Artificial Insemination (AI) among dairy farmers. Scrub bulls were identified in advance by Gewog Extension Officers and pooled at common, accessible locations within

each Geog. Sterilization was carried out using open surgical castration for very young and old bulls, and Burdizzo castration for suitable age groups, following standard animal welfare practices.

The program was successfully executed, resulting in the sterilization of 695 scrub bulls across the Dzongkhag. Chaskhar Gewog recorded the highest number (168), followed by Mongar (152) and Depong (92), while moderate coverage was observed in Chali (90) and Saling (75). Lower numbers were reported from Silambi (37), Gondue (37), Balam (31), and Tsakaling (13), reflecting differences in cattle population density, accessibility, and availability of scrub bulls.

The program achieved its objectives and represents a key intervention for systematic breeding control in Mongar Dzongkhag; annual implementation of similar programs is recommended to sustain genetic improvement. 
The technical committee team visited around 200 cattle rearing households to conduct pre-selection using the standard cattle judging criteria. The shortlisted cattle from three categories were further scrutinized and selected 15

cattle from each category for the rally during the program. The program concluded with the awarding of the prizes to all 15 finalist in each categories. And top three milk producers in the year 2025 from dairy farmers group were presented with the prizes.

Summary of Land Services Delivered in the Year 2025




Table No. 1. Total Number of Services provided in Monggar Dzongkhag 2025

of LUCs, 2 court verdict cases, and 10 private land acquisitions.

The completion of these cases and issuance of Lagthrams demonstrates the Dzongkhag Land Sector's commitment to efficient service delivery, accurate land records, and secure land ownership across all gewogs.

In 2025, the Dzongkhag Land Sector successfully completed 323 land service cases across various gewogs, with all cases fully approved. A total of 572 Lagthrams (land certificates) were issued to landowners, covering new land transactions as well as replacements for lost certificates.

Of the total cases, 83 were inheritance cases, 45 were sale and purchase cases, 36 involved land conversions, and 34 concerned lease lands. Other services included 28 late name changes, 21 changes in thram ownership type, 14 Khasho registrations, 13 plot realignments, 11 gift transactions, 9 plot consolidations and segregations, 8 land exchanges, 4 LUC approvals, 3 corrections to thram and plot details, 2 annulments or voluntary surrenders of LUCs, 2 court verdict cases, and 10 private land acquisitions.

Boosting Tourism in the Region

1. Stakeholder meeting in Guwahati

A stakeholder meeting to boost tourism in the region was organized by the Bhutan CG Office, Guwahati, and was attended by representatives of Assam tour operators and Dzongdags from the eastern Dzongkhags. The meeting facilitated a meaningful and constructive discussion among all parties, focusing on key challenges, opportunities, and strategies for enhancing the region's tourism potential. Participants emphasized the importance of coordinated efforts, improved promotion, and sustainable tourism practices.



The stakeholders unanimously agreed to collaborate closely and work in partnership to strengthen tourism infrastructure, attract more visitors, and promote the region as a vibrant and attractive destination.

2. River rafting and Fly-Fishing

River rafting and fly-fishing are emerging as exciting adventure tourism activities with strong potential to attract both regional and international tourists. The pristine rivers of our country, surrounded by scenic landscapes and rich biodiversity, offer ideal conditions for adventure sports as well as nature-based experiences. To promote these activities and build local capacity, a trial rafting expedition was conducted as part of a hands-on training program for local community members.

The trial rafting route starts from Gongrizomsa to Telung, at Yangbari Golden Masheer Lodge, and could be extended till Pangbang. The distance from Gongrizomsa to Telung is about 14 km of river course. The stretch was found to be ideal for river rafting and kayaking, featuring suitable rapids, safe flow conditions, and breathtaking surroundings.



Alongside rafting, the river also holds promise for fly-fishing, adding to its appeal for international adventure and eco-tourism enthusiasts. With proper training, infrastructure, and promotion, river rafting and fly-fishing can become key attractions, generating livelihood opportunities for local communities while positioning the region as a premier adventure tourism

Status and Progress of HICDP Projects

1. SDP Work Progress

In the 13th Plan, Dzongkhags and Gewogs have received 67.50 M and 30.70 M fund respectively under the High Impact Cooperation Development Project (HICDP). The works under the HICDP are progressing steadily with systematic implementation of road improvement components, bridge construction, water supply & irrigation system. Regular field supervision and coordination have helped address site-specific site challenges including utility constraints, and traffic management. Blacktopping of shorter



these challenges were mitigated through combined phased execution, resource sharing, and continuous monitoring. The implementation process highlighted the importance of advance planning, stakeholder coordination, and timely deployment of resources.

Quality monitoring was accorded high priority throughout the execution of HICDP projects. Regular inspections and prescribed tests were carried out at various stages to ensure strict compliance with approved specifications. Granular Sub-Base (GSB) materials were subjected to impact and gradation tests prior to laying, while compaction and field density tests were conducted after completion of laying to confirm adequacy, strength, and suitability. Continuous quality surveillance, proper documentation, and prompt rectification of any deviations have significantly enhanced construction quality and durability. The lessons learnt from execution and quality control practices will contribute to more efficient and effective implementation of future projects.
